Found - An 18"x18"x14" sandstone, firmly set 10" in the
ground, with a chiseled "X" on top and chiseled
"Cl 42" on NE face, from which

A point of exposed bedrock with chiseled markings
"X Cl 42" bears S.29°W., 22.3 ft. (Rec.
S.25°30'W., 22.0 ft.)

We cannot detect any signs of disturbance in the vicinity of
the found stone even though its position disagrees with the
recorded measurements to the found bearing object and its
markings "Cl 42" face DLC 39. We do not find the bearing
object located S.80°W., 50.3 ft. per Cole. There is no
remaining evidence of the original corner stone or its BTs.
We do not set a brass cap due to soil depth of approx. 1 ft.
to bedrock.

New bearing objects:

A chiseled "X BO" in 3" high letters on exposed
bedrock at the top of an approx. 30 ft. high
cliff overlooking the Umpqua River, bears
S.18°E., 13.4 ft.

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A chiseled "Δ BO" in 2" high letters on exposed bedrock approx. 15 ft. North of the top of a 30 ft. high cliff overlooking the Umpqua River, bears S.81°W., 17.2 ft.
