No other tree in limits.  
A solid rock 30" high, 24" dia. bears N.54°E., 18 lks. dist. mkd. ¼ S.

Found - A 1½" iron pipe with 3" brass cap mkd "¼ S16 S21 1972 RS359" per M51-28.  
A rotten stump with no visible marks bears N.65°E., 18.7'.  
A rotten fir stump with visible scribe bears S.28°E., 21.8'.  
New BTs- A 16" Fir face scribed "S¼ S16 BT" with mag nail and washer stamped "LS2703" in bottom of face and with x-chop and YMLP at breast height bears N.88°E., 44.1' to a spike at side center.  
A 9" Fir face scribed "N¼ S21 BT" with mag nail and washer stamped "LS2703" in bottom of face and with x-chop and YMLP at breast height bears S.32°E., 21.3' to a spike at side center.  
An 18" Fir face scribed "N¼ S21 BT" with mag nail and washer stamped "LS2703" in bottom of face and with x-chop and YMLP at breast height bears S.03°W., 21.8' to a spike at side center.  
A 12" Fir face scribed "N¼ S21 BT" with mag nail and washer stamped "LS2703" in bottom of face and with x-chop and YMLP At breast height bears S.86°W., 13.2' to a spike at side center.  
New BO - An orange carsonite post bears west 2.0'.
