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20" now 24" dia., 1 ft. high rotted D.Fir stump, no scribing visible, bears N.61°E., 13.5 ft. to center.  
BTs noted in 1973 DCSO as being from an unrecorded renewal dated 8-13-1969:  
16" D.Fir now 25" dia., Hemlock with a fully healed double blaze, bears N.30°E., 18.9 ft.  
30" now 39" dia., D.Fir, with a fully healed double blaze, bears S.74°W., 21.3 ft.,  
10" Fir now 13" D.Fir down & fallen on blaze, root crown agrees well with rec. S.47°E., 16.3 ft.  
New BT - 11" dia., Hemlock, double blazed & scribed "T23S R9W S25 CS BT", bears S.67½°E., 18 ft.

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The cor. of secs. 23, 24, 25, & 26, perpetuated by the Douglas Co. Surveyor's Office in 1973 and further perpetuated by Smith, in 1995; monumented with an iron post, 1" dia., firmly set, with top flush with the surface of the ground, with a brass cap (properly) mkd.  
from which the remains of the original bearing trees  
A decayed fir stump, size indeterminate, bears N.65½°E., 12.5 ft., no marks visible. (Record, N.61°E.)  
A root hole bears S.33°E., 52.8 ft., alongside of which is a down fir stump, 24" dia., no marks visible.  
A high fir stump, 48" diam., bears N.24°W., 7.9 ft., with scribe marks 9W and other illegible scribe marks visible on bark at breast height. A steel fence post is 1 ft. E. of the stump.  
and the BTs mkd. by the Douglas County Surveyor's Office  
A hemlock, 30" dia., bears N.31½°E., 18.7 ft., with a healed blaze.  
A fir, 47" dia., bears S.73½°W., 21.1 ft., with a healed blaze. Tree is partially behind a hemlock, 30" dia.  
and a bearing tree mkd. by Smith  
A hemlock, 13" dia., bears S.67¾°E., 18.8 ft., with a healed double blaze.  
and a new bearing tree  
A hemlock, 12" dia., bears N.40°W., 23.0 ft., mkd. T23S R9W S23 BT.  
Drive an aluminum angle iron alongside the cor.  
A search was made for the original line tree bet. secs. 23 and 24 and it was not recovered.
