

PRIMARY CORNER DESCRIPTION 1/4 Cor. Secs. 28 & 33

Alias	Description
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GLO survey by Carl S. Nicklin, Dep. Surveyor under contract # 664, dated May 23, 1896 - (DCSO recs Vol. 7 Page(s) 2827)  
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Set a basalt stone 121x10x8" 8" in the ground for 1/4 sec. cor. marked 1/4 on N face, from which  
    A fir, 12" dia., bears N.41 1/2°E., 17 lks., mkd: 1/4 S BT.  
    A fir, 12" dia., bears S.8°W., 27 lks., mkd: 1/4 S BT.  
This cor. is on a steep hillside, sloping E about 100 ft. above dry creek bed.

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Found - Rock called for by Nicklin mkd: "1/4S" on N face.  
    D.Fir now 20" N.41 1/2°E., 11.7 ft., not 11.2 ft. Old scar very plain. Blaze & rescribe this tree "1/4 S28 CS BT"  
    D.Fir now 24" S.8°W., 16.8 ft., not 17.8 ft. Old scar very plain, rescribe this tree "1/4 S33 CS BT"  
Alongside rock at cor. set brass cap mkd:  
    COUNTY SURVEYORS OFFICE 1962  
    T24S R1W 1/4 S28/S33  
No new BTs needed.

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Found - 1962 County brass cap, properly marked on iron pipe. Orig. stone with portion of mark "1/4" remaining on easterly face. Stone is on southerly edge of brass cap monument.  
    Orig. 12" fir, now 18" dia., 5 ft. high stump, bears N.38°E., 11.9 ft. (rec. per orig. N.41 1/2°E., 11.2 ft. 1962 rec, N.41 1/2°W.) Stump has 2 healed blazes  
    Orig. 12" fir now 22" dia., with well healed blaze bears S.7°W., 16.3 ft. (orig. rec. S.8°W., 17.8 ft., rec. per 1962 is 16.8 ft.)  
New - A 1/2"x8" spike in top of an 18" dia., fir stump, bears N.52°W., 9.7 ft. Spike set through a "Douglas County Surveyors Office" BT tag.  
    18" D.Fir, double blazed & scribed "1/4 S33 CS BT" bears S.60°E., 16.0 ft.  
Note - This corner lies on an east slope, in an E-W cutting line. Clear cut to the North. It appears the cor. is approx. 50 ft. above dry creek bed to the east & 200 ft. ± below ridge call to the West.
