A W.Oak 12" dia., bears N.37°E., 158 lks. dist.
A B.Oak 12" dia., bears N.41°W., 225 lks. dist.

Set 5/8" Iron rod, from which

Found - A 5/8"x30" long iron rod the top of which is bent west 1½" & buried 4" below ground surface. 1966
A ½" dia., iron pipe noted as the corner monument in the DCSO Map M168-11 is set protruding 2" above ground. The top of this leaning iron pipe is N.72°W., 0.6 ft. from the plumb position of the fd. 5/8" iron rod. The base of this fd iron pipe is 2" west of the plumb iron rod position. Accessories fd and new are measured from the plumb base of the fd 5/8" iron rod.

A wide search for the orig. BTs was made but no evidence was fd.
A 10" W.Oak now a 26" dia., W.Oak with a fully healed double blaze; bears N.3¼°W., 59.6 ft. (rec. N.3°15'W., 60.0 ft.) 1966

New - The plumb position of the base of the fd 5/8" iron rod is referenced out, the rod is removed, straightened and the returned to the referenced position. The top of the now plumb iron rod is approx 2" lower than the ground surface. (The ½" iron pipe is left as fd.)

A 15" dia. D.Fir scribed "¼ S18" "CS BT" on a double blaze; bears N.40½°E., 52.0 ft.

A 24" dia., D.Fir scribed "¼ S13 CS" "BT" on a double blaze; bears N.72½°W., 9.8 ft.

Note: Corner is in west edge of N-S running field access road (dirt) and just east of a fence corner with fences running north and west. Corner is toward north end of an open field surrounded by fir, oak and maple woods. Decl. 15½°E
