The E 1/16 sec. cor. of secs. 14 & 23, remonumented by the Douglas Co Surveyor's Office in 1976, & perpetuated by Gary Smither, monumented with an iron post, 1¼" dia., firmly set projecting 3" above ground, with brass cap (properly) mkd. from which the remains of a bearing tree mkd. by Jelley

A decayed fir stump, size indeterminate, bears N.60°E., 27.1 ft., with fallen trunk lying alongside, no marks visible.

A sawed, decayed stump, 15" dia., bears N.68½°E., 78.0 ft., with no scribe marks visible on a partially healed blaze.
