GENERAL DESCRIPTION

The lands included in the notes of the foregoing resurvey are located about 25 miles southwesterly from Sutherlin, Oregon. The area is drained by Hubbard Creek, Elgarose Creek, and a number of their tributaries. Elevations range from about 600 feet above sea level, near the 1/4 section corner of sections 34 and 35, to about 2,700 feet above sea level, near the corner of sections 25, 30, 31, and 36, on the west boundary of the township.

Access is gained by way of Hubbard Creek Road, a paved and gravelled road which extends westerly from Sutherlin, also by Callahan Road and numerous other logging and private roads.

Soil consists of rock, clay, and sandy loam. There are a number of rock outcroppings and bluffs throughout the area.

Due to fires in the past, most of the timber has been burned or logged. A few stands of timber remain on the ridges and bottom lands and consists of fir, cedar, hemlock, oak, alder, madrone, maple, and chinquapin. Undergrowth consists of vine maple, hazel, ceanothus, fern, poison oak, salal, Oregon grape, arrowwood, huckleberry, blackberry, salmonberry, and rhododendron.

The area is valuable mainly for its timber, with some grazing in the southeasterly parts of the township. There are a few residents in sections 27, 33, and 34.
