A fir snag, 42 ins. diam., bears S. 25° E., 14 lks. dist., with bark scribe BT visible.

A hemlock, 27 ins. diam., bears N. 44½° W., 27 lks. dist., with healed blaze.

A white fir, 23 ins. diam., bears S. 50° E., 82 lks. dist., with healed blaze.

A root hole, bears N. 25° W., 45½ lks. dist., with down yew alongside, 15 ins. diam., with fragmentary scribe marks visible.

Land, mountainous.

Soil, rocky clay.

Timber, fir, hemlock, cedar, myrtle, madrone, alder, and chinquapin; undergrowth, vine maple, fern, salal, poison oak, blackberry, and Oregon grape.

Dependent Resurvey of a Portion of the Boundaries
of Donation Land Claim No. 41,
T. 28 S., R. 8 W., Willamette Meridian, Oregon

(Restoring the survey by Josiah A. Burnett,
U.S. deputy Surveyor, in 1857)

From the SW. cor. of Donation Land Claim No. 41, perpetuated and recorded by J. W. Cole, County Surveyor, in 1915, from original evidence no longer in existence, reestablished and recorded by Arthur R. Evans, Registered Professional Engineer, No. 2741, in 1951, using Cole's record; subsequently perpetuated and recorded by John M. Powell, Deputy County Surveyor, in 1966, monumented with an iron pipe, $\frac{1}{2}$ in. diam., firmly set, projecting 4 ins. above ground, from which the remains of bearing trees mkd. by Evans:

A sawed fir stump, 30 ins. diam., bears N. 60° E., 26 lks. dist., with healed blaze.

A fir, 16 ins. diam., bears S. 56° W., 12 lks. dist. with healed double blaze.

and a bearing tree mkd. by Powell

A white fir, 10 ins. diam., bears N. 17° E., 18 lks. dist., with fragmentary scribe marks visible on partially healed blaze.
