the margin of the marsh, preventing a clear view, I will use this fir tree, being isolated and very conspicuous, as a back flag. I go now North, without chaining, as I have to cross a swamp to the foot of the opposite hill, and being North of my back flag, I set a peg, called No. 1. Thence I go by boat to the margin of the lake, where a line due East intersects back flag; here I set a flag called meander flag. I then return to peg No. 1 and ran by traverse

and intersecting due N. of my meander flag.

55.86 Set a post, 5 ft. long, 4 ins. sq., 24 ins. in the ground, for meander cor. to frac. secs. 6 & 7, along margin of Ten Mile Lake, marked M C on W. face and T 20 S on E., R 11 W, S 6 on N., S 7 on S. sides; there are no bearing trees within 5 chs. and it is impossible to dig pits and throw up mounds, as the water is now 2½ ft. deep at the post, the marsh extending to the lake and only the growth of tule grass indicating the line between lake and marsh.

40.00 Set temp. ¼ sec. cor.

90.75 Intersect North boundary of Tp., 207 lks. West of cor. to secs. 31, 32, 5 & 6, which is a post, 4 ins. sq., marked T 19 S S 32 on NE., T 20 S S 5 on SE., R 11 W S 6 on SW., S 31 on NW. faces, with 5 notches on E. and 1 notch on W. edges; from which

A willow, 5 ins. dia., bears N.33°E., 198 lks. dist.,

marked T 19 S R 11 W S 32 B T.
