Retracement of Portion North Bdy., T. 20 S., R. 10 W.

CHAINS

I commence at the cor. of secs. 4, 5, 32, and 33, on N. bdy. of T. 20 S., R. 10 W., which has recently been perpetuated by a cedar post, 5 ins. sq., 18 ins. above ground, firmly set, marked T 19 S S 33 on NE., R 10 W S 4 on SE., T 20 S S 5 on SW. and S 32 on NW. face, witnessed by two of the original bearing trees, agreeing with the recorded description, except as to the bearing of the NW. bearing tree. The original NE. bearing tree is found, dead and detached from its original position, marks still decipherable. No trace is found of the original SE. bearing tree.

From the corner,

(New bearing tree) A fir, 30 ins. diam., bears N.35° E., 33 lks. dist., marked T 19 S R 10 W S 33 B T.

(New bearing tree) An alder, 12 ins. diam., bears S.5°E., 42 lks. dist., marked T 20 S R 10 W S 4 B T.

(Old bearing tree) A fir, 20 ins. diam., bears S.85° W., 15 lks. wide., marked T 20 S R 10 W S 5 B T.

(Old bearing tree) A fir, 18 ins. diam., bears N.77° W., 45 lks. dist., marked T 19 S R 10 W S 32 B T.

Thence

N.89°49'E., retracing N. bdy. of T. 20 S., R. 10 W., setting temp. cors. at intervals of 40.00 chs., making diligent search for evidences of survey. The topography on the first mile agrees fairly well with the record; thereafter little resemblance is found. Fisher Creek, a considerable tributary of the North Fork of Smith River; flowing Northerly through Secs. 2 and 35, is not mentioned in the field notes, nor shown on the plat. No corners are found between the cor. of secs. 4, 5, 32 and 33, and the cor. which I accept as cor. of Tps. 19 and 20 S., R. 10 W., but I find a fairly continuous line of old blazes extending as far as this Tp. cor., but no further eastward.
