Timber, principally Fir and Spruce.

Underbrush, same, and Vinemaple. Also Salmonberry,
Thimbleberry and Blackberry vines.

North, on true line between Secs. 9 and 10.

- 1.00 Creek 1.50 lks. wide, course NE.
- 14.75 Same, 75 lks. wide, course W.
- 40.00 Set Fir post, 36 ins. long, 5 ins. diam., 20 ins. in
ground for the $\frac{1}{4}$ Sec. corner, from which
 - An Alder, 24 ins. diam., bears N.10*E., 32 lks.
dist.
 - A Fir, 50 ins. diam., bears N.82*W., 98 lks.
dist.
- 40.50 A creek, 3 lks. wide, course SW.
Steep and rugged to North; did not run any further.
Land, hilly, 2nd rate.
Timber, principally Fir, 1st rate.
A very large Sulphur Spring about five chains down large
creek from last crossing.
This section was surveyed at the request of Mr. John
Newell, who has located a Homestead or Preemption in
the SE quarter.
It contains a great amount of 1st rate Fir timber and
a considerable amount has already been removed.
