CHAINS		
65.00	Commence ascending.	
68.00	Enter burnt country; Keep ascending West slope of burnt hill.	
80.00	Mark an Alder 4 ins. in diam., standing on top of a narrow burnt spur, course E and W, for corner to Secs. 22, 23, 26 and 27, from which A Fir, 24 ins. diam., bears N.1*E., 20 lks. dist. A Fir, 16 ins. diam., bears S.26*W., 77 lks. dist. No trees NW and SE. Land, mountainous and 3rd rate. Timber, Fir and Alder.	
	West, on true line between Secs. 22 and 27.	
	Va.19*45'East.	
	As this line goes right down this spur to a creek and then up a sugar loaf mountain with perpendicular rocky bare sides, which range from 20 to 50 feet in height, layer upon layer, I sight line cross to a remarkable dead snag for my flag, thence lay off base North 3.30 chs., flag bears S.80*28'W making 19.84 chs. westing.	
19.84	Rocky Sugar Loaf Mountain., about 2 chs. South is the very pinnacle, thence Along N slope, heavy underbrush.	+800
37.40	Spur, course N and S, begin descent.	
40.00	Set for $\frac{1}{4}$ Sec. post a rock, 18x12x8, from which A double Alder, 5 ins. diam., bears N.89 $\frac{1}{2}$ *W., 22.73 chs. distant.	
	The whole of this line, as also the country East, South and West, and about 10 chs. North, can be very well overlooked from the above Alder bearing tree, which stands on the highest ridge, that I have so far ascended, - it is all the most forlorn looking country I ever saw; it appears to have been burnt
