CHAINS

over about 30 years ago, totally destroying all the timber as far as close to Wasson Creek; where the rain has not washed away the soil from the rocky mountainsides, it has grown up in heavy Huckleberry, Wild Rose, Salalberry and other brush.

There may be about 80 acres in this Section 22, which has any timber value on it; there is young timber on the North part, which may be wanted in 50 years. This burnt timber region does not appear to grow up in timber again, it reaches from here to the top of mountains North of Scottsburg.
