

Meanders of the Umpqua River in T. 21 S., R. 11 W.

CHAINS

General Description.

This Tp. is very mountainous and broken. Unfit for anything except that portion adjoining the river. All that portion of the Tp. S. of the river are rich or overflowed lands, excepting perhaps that portion claimed as a Preemption by C. Marks. All of the valuable timbers have been removed. Some fractions along the river yet have enough to pay their entrance price. Three or four settlements are made on the lands surveyed, viz: in sec. 31, in sec. 33, sec. 34 and in sec. 35. The river is navigable for vessels of all sizes.

East Boundary of T. 21 S., R. 11 W., as surveyed by William Thiel, Deputy Surveyor, under contract No. 567, dated Feb. 16, 1891.

Not being able to find the cor. to secs. 1, 6, 12 and 7, it being a stone, and only one bearing tree; I begin at the $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor. on the E. bdy. of sec. 1, which is a post, badly decayed, 4 ins. sq., 24 ins. above ground, marked $\frac{1}{4}$ S on W. face, from which

A maple, 12 ins. diam., bears N.70*W., 11 lks. dist.
marked $\frac{1}{4}$ S B T.

A cedar, 7 ins. diam., bears S.10*E., 55 lks. dist.
marked $\frac{1}{4}$ S B T.

South, on E. bdy. of sec. 1.

Va.19*48'E.

Descend S. slope of ridge.

64.80 A branch, 6 lks. wide, course E., begin steep ascent of
N. slope.

68.00 Change to ascent of an E. slope.

79.00 Rocky cliffs, 10 ft. high.

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
