4.50 Begin to ascend.

11.25 Top of ridge, bears NW. and SE.

As the line continues to run over a very precipitous country, very difficult to measure by the chain, I sight S.1'E. to a prominent burnt fir, easily identified and standing on the furthest ridge, then lay off base

S.43*E. 4.00 chs.

S.62 $\frac{1}{2}$ *E. 3.00 chs.

flag tree bears S.9*2'W., making southing 8.87 chs. angle 9*3' and base 7.46; = 46.83 chs. across.

40.00 $\frac{1}{2}$ sec. cor. omitted.

66.95 A burnt fir, 24 ins. diam., which I marked with 2 notches on the N. and S. sides; begin descent.

80.00 Set a sandstone 11x10x5 ins. 8 ins. in the ground for cor. to secs. 25 and 26, marked with 1 notch on S. and 1 notch on E. edge; and raised a mound of stone 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ ft. high and 2 ft. base alongside; pits impracticable.

Land, mountainous. 80.00 chs.

Soil, rocky, 4th rate.

Scattering timber, burnt fir.

Dense undergrowth of salmon, huckle, salal and thimble-berries. 80.00 chs.

East bet. secs. 25 and 36.

Va.20*48'E.
