

Subdivisions of T. 21 S., R. 11 W.

CHAINS

spruce, hemlock.

Dense undergrowth of salmon, salal, thimbleberries, vine maples, young hemlock. 79.20 chs.

August 20, 1891.

After a thorough but vain search for the cor. to secs. 7, 8, 17 and 18 or its bearing trees, I return to the cor. of secs. 17, 18, 19 and 20 (having been informed by settler Pyritz, that he has sought repeatedly after the $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor. bet. secs. 17 and 18, but without result) which I re-establish by setting a post, 4 ft. long, 4 ins. sq., 24 ins. in the ground, marked T 21 S S 17 on NE., R 11 W S 20 on SE., S 19 on S W., S 18 on NW faces, with 3 notches on S and 5 notches on W edges, from which

A spruce, 7 ins. diam., bears S.25*W., 2.43 lks.

dist., marked T 21 S R 11 W S 19 B T.

Stump of a spruce, bears N.42*W., 195 lks. dist., no marks visible.

The other two bearing trees have been destroyed.

Thence I run

North, on old line, bet. secs. 18 and 17.

Va.20*14'E.

- 1.50 Leave marsh, bears E and W; enter flat of burnt timber.
- 5.10 Leave flat; enter marsh, bears E and W.
- 16.50 Leave marsh, begin ascend of points; enter green timber, blazed line found.
- 21.25 Mouth of a canyon; begin ascent of E slope; the line along the same is badly blocked up by large timber, partly cut and partly fallen naturally, as we experienced by our search before; and not being fit to be chained, I make an offsett of 5.00 chs. West, which brings us on a tolerable fair, open backbone of spur. I run thence N 18.75 chs. and E 2.60 chs.
