GENERAL DESCRIPTION

The best agricultural portions of this Tp. has been subdivided heretofore. The timbers in the gulches and small creeks putting into the valley are valuable and easy of access

The creeks running through secs. 21 and 28, are sufficiently large to afford water privileges for milling purposes. Many of the other gulches and creeks afford plenty of water for steam power. Timber, principally Fir and Cedar.
