CHAINS

In sec. 13.

N.80*E.	38.00	10 chs., creek 30 lks. wide enter river to point rock. Hill close to river.
East	12.50	
N.78*E.	15.50	55 chs., creek 6 lks. wide from SE. and spring branch
N.63*E.	17.16	To meander corner.

Land, first part, narrow bottom, first rate, remainder, third rate, except first course. Small valley.

Timber, same as last mile.

Underbrush, same.

September 6, 1874.

Old meander post washed away; also witness trees.

Established new post.

From $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. corner, between secs. 13 and 15, North, on true line.

Va. 19*E.

5.60 Intersect South bank of river.

Set a post, 60 ins. long for meander post, from which

General Description

This fractional Township is principally valuable for its timber, being near the mill at Gardiner and ocean communications. The burned portions make excellent cattle range, being generally covered with wild pea.

Four settlements are now made viz; ^{secs.} 13, 15, 17, and 18,

Water power might be obtained from either of the creeks, putting into the river, as they have plenty of water fall.
