General Description

This Township is mountainous and is situated in the
Coast Range of mountains.

The Umpqua river flows through the center of the Township
in a Westerly course.

The soil is generally good, second rate, and in the level
portion of the Township, is very productive.

There is excellent timber in this township, consisting
principally of Fir, Hemlock, Cedar, Alder and Maple.

It is well watered by creeks and springs.

Resurvey of the West Bdy. of T. 22 S., R. 8 W.
Same Deputy and Contract.

Commenced at the corner to secs. 1, 12, 6 and 7,
, which I re-established, as
follows:

Set a Fir post, 4½ feet long, 4 ins. square, 24 ins. in
ground, marked T. 22 S., S. 6 on the NE., R. 8 W., S.
7 on the SE., R. 9 W., S. 12 on the SW. and S. 1 on
the NW. faces, with 5 notches on the S. and 1 notch
