

Meanders of T. 22 S., R. 10 W.

At this point the meander cor. bears S. distance across 34.44. The cor. to secs. 5, 6, 7 & 8 is therefore in the river. At this point I marked a madrone (arbutus) 3 ins. diam. T 22 S R 10 W M C. on S., S 5 on E., & S 6 on W. sides for meander cor. bet. secs. 5 & 6, from which A fir, 24 ins. diam., bears N. 45\*E. 22 lks. dist. marked T 22 S R 10 W S 5 B T. An alder, 10 ins. diam., bears West 10 lks. dist. marked T 22 S R 10 W S 6 B T.

In making investigation and searching for the cor. I had nothing to guide me better than the map furnished me. The course & distances in the meanders being so erroneous that to follow them would lead away from the location of the old lines, I therefore locate the line bet. secs. 6 & 7 by its crossing the island below the middle and entering a short bend on the east side of the river as represented in the map & notes. If I divided the distance as instructed in the manual it would miss the island altogether, falling north of it.

From the meander cor. bet. secs. 6 & 7 on the left bank of the river I run with the meanders in sec. 7.
