General Description

CHAINS

13 & 14 along the river on the right bank, Mr. McAfee has a ranch in secs. 8 & 17 and Mr. Lender in sec. 16 on the N. bank of river. Mr. Harvey is in sec. 6, Indian Charley in sec. 8 and (Indian woman) Charlot (Sharlot) has a claim at the mouth of Charlot Creek in sec. 17.

The principal river, the Umpqua runs from the E. bdy. in sec. 13 N. N. westerly course leaving the township in the central part of the W. bdy. sec. 6, has an average width of some 10 or 12 chs. and is navigable for vessels of 200 tons. Two islands are in this river one in sec. 17 and Brandy Bar in 6 & 7. This river carries a much larger amount of water than streams of its size usually do, it is therefore swifter and the changes along the banks more marked than is usual.

The streams that drain this township into the Umpqua are Mill Creek in the central south side which receives the water from Loon lake in T 23 S. and Camp Creek in sec. 36, Lender Creek S. S. W. part mouth in sec. 21, N. bdy., Little Mill Creek, mouth in sec. 13, Charlot Creek mouth in sec. 17, Franklin Creek mouth in sec. 8, and Harvey Creek in sec. 6. This last is of considerable size about 1.50 chs. at mouth.

One principal divide runs through secs. 13, 12, 11, 1 & 2 on which a trail runs to Harvey Creek, another through secs. 33, 32, 31 (& 25, 24 & 13 in R. 11 W.) and 8, 7 & 6. On the side of this divide in secs. 33, 32 & 31 the water runs into Coos River.

The game of this township is now scarce, a few deer with occasional elk, some bear, panther, wildcats, lynx, mink, coon, a very few beaver and a few others comprise the list of animals while of the birds few were seen & those of the most ordinary species except the northwestern fish crow more rare was seen along the river.
