General Description.

CHAINS	<p>Mountain trout were in all the streams and salmon and other fish in the river.</p> <p>The geological age of the formation is undoubtedly Eocene and later. No limestone or igneous rocks were found.</p> <p>The main declination is 20*20'E.</p>
	<p>Retracement of the N. Bdy. of T. 23 S., R. 10 W. As surveyed by Levi C. Walker, Deputy Surveyor, Under contract, No. 763, dated June 20, 1905.</p>
	<p>At the cor. of Tp. 23, S., Rs. 10 and 11 W.</p> <p>Thence I run</p> <p>East, on a blank line along the N. bdy. of sec. 6.</p> <p>Ascend over mountainous land through heavy timber and dense undergrowth.</p>
10.50	Cross summit of divide, bears NE. and SW., and enter old burn covered with logs.
31.00	Recross the same divide, bears NW. and SE. Enter green timber and descend.
40.76	Intersect the cor. to secs. 31 and 32, T. 22 S., R. 10 W., which is a post, firmly set, marked and witnessed as described by the Surveyor General. I also make diligent search for the old $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor. set at a point 8.25 chs. west of this cor. but can find no evidence of it.
50.00	Cross summit of divide, bears NE. and SW.
59.00	Cross a small spur, and descend steep.
73.10	Branch, 1 lk. wide, course SE.
75.48	My line falls 80 lks. N. of the C. C. of secs. 5 & 6, T. 23 S., R. 10 W., heretofore described. The true bearing of this line East of the cor. of secs. 31 and 32, T. 22 S., R. 10 W. is there N.88*41'W. Land, mountainous. Soil, 3rd rate. Timber, 2nd growth fir.
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
