marked T 23 S R 11 W S 6 B T.

A fir, 60 ins. diam., bears S.57*E. 298 lks. dist.
marked T 23 S R 11 W S 5 B T.

An alder, 8 ins. diam., bears N.20*W. 46 lks. dist.
marked T 22 S R 11 W S 31 B T.

The whole line except 6 or 7 chs. runs over rough hills
or spurs and is densely covered with forests of dead
fir and cedar and green myrtle, maple and alder timber.
Thick undergrowth of thimbleberry, huckleberry and briars.
The bottom land, 2nd rate. The balance, 3rd rate.

There being one settler claiming in NW. $\frac{1}{4}$ of sec. 5, I
therefore continued the survey
