E and 4 notches on W edges, from which

Stump of Alder, 24 ins. diam., bears S.61*W., 42
lks. dist., marked B T.

Stump of Alder, 12 ins. diam., bears N.32*E., 202
lks. dist., marked B T.

in accordance with the description in the field notes
furnished me.

For closing cor. to Secs. 35 and 36 I set an Alder post,
4 ft. long, 4 ins. sq., 24 ins. in the ground marked
C C T 22 S R 12 W on N S 36 on E and S 35 on W faces,
with 1 notch on E and 5 notches on W faces, from which

An Alder, 10 ins. diam., bears N.13*E., 87 lks.
dist., marked T 22 S R 12 W S 36 B T.

An Alder, 6 ins. diam., bears N.67*W., 106 lks.
dist., marked T 22 S R 12 W S 35 B T.

No tree in Sec. 2 within limits.

I was unable to find post or bearing trees to corner
of Secs. 1 and 2, T 23 S R 12 W as this mountain has
been burnt over, the $\frac{1}{2}$ Sec. cor. bet. Secs. 2 and 35
not having been established, I was obliged to connect
with corner to Secs. 2 and 3.

Land, mountainous.

Soil, rocky, 3rd rate.

Timber, Fir, Alder, Maple, Cherry and Chittenwood.

Undergrowth, Salmon, Salal, Huckle, Thimble and Black-
berries.

23, which is a Fir post, 4 ins. sq., 24 ins. in the
ground, marked T 22 S S 23 on NE R 12 W S 26 on SE
