their crests, and show the underlying sandrock. The few valleys are situated along the larger creeks, are very narrow; only exceeding three chains in width, where another side branch joins the main creek. The soil of these valleys is a very rich loam, which, if not marshy, is covered with a dense growth of Salmonberries, reaching the height of twelve feet.

The country is generally well watered, excepting Sections 34 and 35. Sections 36, 25 and 24 are occupied by the high rocky mountain range, dividing the waters flowing into Dean Creek, Schofield River, Ten Mile Creek and Coos River, which mountains are periodically burnt over, are at the present time without a drop of water, and are of no value as agricultural or timber lands. Excepting Carlson's, in Section 35, there are no grains produced, the extent of cultivable land being so small, even hay is raised only to a small extent; the settlers keeping cattle as part of their means of sustenance, depend largely upon the work at logging camps or saw mills for a living. The portion of this township, now subdivided, embraces all the cultivable land which I consider surveyable under existing regulations and my special instructions.

The East boundary of this township, which is at present unsurveyed, runs over and along the rocky mountain range, which divides the waters flowing into Dean Creek, Schofield River, Coos River and
