GENERAL DESCRIPTION

Township 22 South, Range 12 West, contains much mountainous with some level bottom and bench land. The soil generally is of a good rate: along the Water courses and on the benches the soil is of a rich alluvial and sandy loam, and will produce crops of all kinds without irrigation. Where the land is not too steep it is all suitable for farming when cleared. Even the steep hill sides when covered with grass which is true when cleared make excellent grazing for sheep and goats. This is a fine dairy country and there is a good market available for the cream. However, much of the land, especially on the higher altitudes, is of a very rough nature, difficult to get over on account of numerous spurs and ravines all of which are covered with a dense undergrowth and with scattering or heavy timber, some of which is of a fair quality.

The Township is well watered by Murphy Creek in the South, Schofield and Wind Rivers in the N., and their numerous tributaries of small creeks and rills.

This country is well connected with Gardner on the Bay, by Schofield River, logging railway and wagon road. Some of the regions here surveyed, as well as the country
