CHAINS

to settlement had been, that the mountain range, which divides the waters of Yellow Creek and Calapooya Creek, has on the South and West side, which are nearest to the main valley and their market, an almost perpendicular crest, where it will be costly to make a wagon road, while to follow Yellow Creek down to it's mouth, will lengthen the road from ten to fifteen miles. It is very likely that there will be some more surveying required this year in this township.
