55.50	Mag. decl. 19*E
81.40	Top of ridge, bears S.70*E., and N.70*W., about 50 ft. above last point of crossing road Descend
93.79	Set a fir post, 4 ft. long, 4 ins. sq. 24 ins. in the ground, for $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor. marked $\frac{1}{4}$ S on N face, from which A fir, 6 ins. diam., bears N.28*E., 36 lks. dist. Marked $\frac{1}{4}$ S B T A hemlock, 30 ins. diam., bears S.43*E., 14 lks. dist. Marked $\frac{1}{4}$ S B T This cor. is on a hillside, sloping NE., about 250 ft. below ridge
106.45	A fir, 18 ins. diam., on line, I mark with 2 notches on E and W sides
118.01	Creek, 2 lks. wide, course N about 300 ft. below $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor. Begin ascent
