Retracement of E. Bdy. of T. 24 S., R. 2 W.

## CHAINS

This township forms a part of a vast mining district, and quartz veins are found at intervals throughout its area. Almost the entire surface is covered with a dense undergrowth of rhododendron, vine-maple, chinquapin, madrona, hemlock, mountain-balm, fir, pine, huckle-berry, salal-berry, hazel, and dog-wood.

There is some good timber, the most valuable being hemlock but in general, it is scattering fir, hemlock, cedar, chinquapin, pine, madrona, yew, alder, maple, dogwood, and oak.

Through the Northern part of the township lies a trail between Oakland and Bohemia mines. This is the only route by which it is accessible. Near the trail is, under course of construction, a wagon road which is to extend from Oakland to Bohemia. At this time, it has been completed from Oakland through secs. 7 & 8.

There are no settlers in the township; but some mining claims are located along the North tier of sections.
