General Description

This fractional Township is mountainous and broken by
high ridges and deep canyons, and is densely covered
with forest of fir, hemlock, maple, alder and dogwood,
with a thick undergrowth of vine maple, hazel, alder,
salmon brush.

It is well watered by mountain streams.

A very small portion of land is tillable along the water
courses as the bottoms are very narrow.

Preliminary to commencing the subdivision of this town-
ship, I go to the corner of Tps. 24 and 25 S., Rs. 1
and 2 West, which is a post, $4\frac{1}{2}$ ft. long and 4 ins. sq.,
firmly set in the ground and marked T 24 S S 31 on NE.,
R 1 W S 6 on SE., T 25 S S 1 on SW., and R 2 W S 36 on
