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The quality of the land of this Township varies from the rich alluvial bottoms along the creek to the sterile rocky, scraged mountain-tops.

Upon a fair estimate one third of the land subdivided might be cultivated. Two thirds of the remainder made pasture lands and the remainder unfit for any thing except the timber.

The timber in general is of the first quality. Fir, hemlock, cedar, maple, yew, ash, etc. pretty equally distributed over the Township.

There is a saw-mill in sec. 31 and others might be established almost any where along the main creek in the Township with plenty of timber close at hand.

Several settlements are begun in this Township but as yet undefined.

From the corner to Secs. 13, 18, 19 & 24, Tp. 24 S., between Ranges 2 & 3 W. which is a post 4 ins. sq. firmly set in ground marked T 24 S S 18 on NE., R 2 W S 19 on SE., R 3 W S 24 on SW., and S 13 on NW. faces with 3 notches on N. & S. edges from which
