

Resurvey of West Boundary T. 24 S., R 8 W.

CHAINS

with 4 notches on South and 2 notches on North edges, from which

A Fir, 16 ins. diam., bears N.76*E., 116 lks. dist., marked T 24 S R 8 W S 7 - B T.

A Fir, 18 ins. diam., bears S.39*E., 54 lks. dist., marked T 24 S R 8 W S 18 - B T.

A Fir, 40 ins. diam., bears S.45*W., 25 lks. dist., marked T 24 S R 8 W S 7 and 18 - B T.

Land, broken.

Soil, 2nd and 4th rate.

Heavily timbered with Fir and Hemlock. 80.00 chs.

Dense undergrowth of hemlock, hazel and salal. 80.00 chs.

May 20th, 1894.

North, on West boundary Sec. 7.

Va. 20*E.

Through heavy timber and dense undergrowth.

25.00 A Creek, 10 lks wide, flows SE.

40.00 Set a post 4 ft. long, 4 ins. sq., 24 ins. in the ground for $\frac{1}{2}$ sec. cor. marked $\frac{1}{2}$ S on E. face, from which

A Laurel, 12 ins. diam., bears S.56 $\frac{1}{2}$ *E., 35 lks. dist., marked $\frac{1}{2}$ S B T.

A Chinquapin, 12 ins. diam., bears S.57*W., 21 lks. dist., marked $\frac{1}{2}$ S B T.

I kept a careful lookout in running along this line but found no trace of the old $\frac{1}{2}$ Sec. cor.

68.25 The old established cor. to Secs. 1, 6, 7 and 12, which is a Laurel, 5 ins. diam., marked T 24 S S 6 on NE., R 8 W S 7 on SE., R 9 W S 12 on SW., and S 1 on NW faces, with 5 notches on South and 1 notch on North edges, from which

A Laurel, 8 ins. diam., bears N.70*E., 17 lks. dist., marked T 24 S R 8 W S 6 - B T.
