CHAINS

Timber, fir, pine, hemlock and cedar.

Undergrowth, chinquapin, maple, rhododendron, arbutus
and spicewood.

Mountainous land, or land covered with heavy timber or
dense undergrowth, 80.47 chs.

NOTE:

In the survey of T. 25 S., R 1 W., where closing
corners were set on exterior lines, the marks on
all old section corners were destroyed, which
referred to the sections bounded by closing lines.

GENERAL DESCRIPTION:

This Township is very rough and mountainous through-
out. With the exception of the south tier of
sections, portions of which have been burned over,
the whole township is covered with heavy growth of
good merchantable timber; the most valuable of
which is Red Fir and Sugar Pine.

The Township is well watered by Canton Creek on the
east and tributaries of Rock Creek in the western
part, which probably afford sufficient water to
flume the timber to market.

No mineral of any kind in paying quantities has been
found, although indications of such are present.

There are no settlers in this township.

The stream which flows through the township from
north to south, is locally known as "Canton Creek",
and not "McKinley", as indicated on the map furnished
me by the surveyor general.
