GENERAL DESCRIPTION

The quality of the land in this Tp. is above the common average of the Umpqua valley. The Calapooya creek, running through the Tp. from E. to W. affords a sufficient supply of excellent water and on each side of which are rich bottom lands, suitable for the growth of all kinds of grain, commonly raised on Oregon. Along the N. and S. Bdys. are some high hills timbered with Oak, Fir and Laurel. The soil on the hills is generally a red clay and of an inferior quality. Secs. 6, 7, and 18, are principally high, rugged mountains, heavily timbered with Fir and are unsurveyed. There are probably in this Tp. about 25 settlers, principally in the Calapooya valley.
