

Resurvey of Subdivisional Lines, T. 26 S., R. 2 W.

CHAINS	<p>I commence at the cor. of secs. 1, 2, 35 and 36, on S. bdy. of the Tp., heretofore described</p> <p>Thence</p> <p>N.15*13'W., resurveying the line bet. secs. 35 and 36.</p> <p>Over mountainous land, through dense timber and undergrowth</p> <p>Gradually ascend SE slope</p> <p>14.10 Creek, 1 lk. wide, course SE</p> <p>17.85 Creek, 1 lk. wide, course SE</p> <p>24.62 Intersect the $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor., reestablished by Deputy Gibb in 1909 and described by him as the original cor. established by Deputy McQuinn in 1883, which is a granite stone, 5x10x6 ins. above ground, firmly set, marked and witnessed as described by the surveyor general, except that the position of the trees does not exactly agree with the field notes. I now perpetuate this cor., as follows:</p> <p>Set an iron post, 3 ft. long, 1 in. diam., 26 ins. in the ground, 1 lk. W. of the stone set by Gibb, with brass cap marked</p> <div style="text-align: center;"> $\frac{1}{4}$ S35 S36 1916 </div> <p>From which</p> <p style="padding-left: 40px;">A fir, 16 ins. diam., bears S.80*E., 26 lks. dist. Marked $\frac{1}{4}$ S 36 B T</p> <p style="padding-left: 40px;">A cedar, 10 ins. diam., bears N.48*W., 56 lks. dist. Marked $\frac{1}{4}$ S 35 B T</p> <p>I destroy the corresponding cor. of rejected revision survey and marks on bearing trees.</p> <p>Thence</p> <p>N.0*26'E., continuing my measurement.</p> <p>38.10 Creek, 3 lks. wide, course SE, ascend steep SW slope</p> <p>43.40 Ravine, course SW</p> <p>50.30 Rocky spur, slopes SW</p>
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
