GENERAL DESCRIPTION

The West half of this township is good farming land and is all claimed (or nearly all) by settlers, for cultivation, pasturage and timber. The East half is very mountainous, rocky and covered with a heavy growth of timber. In the northern part of East $\frac{1}{2}$ a claim has been located on the South side of the North Umpqua River, for the purpose of mining coal (said to be of a good quality of bitumenous coal) I learn that other indications in the vicinity are found which may make it desireable to survey a portion of remainder of township yet unsurveyed.
