GENERAL DESCRIPTION

Secs. 7, 8, 9, 10, 11 and 12 are rough and mountainous except a narrow strip of land along Little River.

The soil is mostly rocky and can nearly all be classed as 3rd and 4th rate. These secs. are covered for most of their area with a scattering growth of Fir, Pine, Cedar and Hemlock timber. There are 3 settlers in Sec. 8 and 2 in Sec. 12. John Gardiner in the SE $\frac{1}{4}$ of Sec. 8 has a house and barn and 4 or 5 acres under cultivation. The approximate value of his improvements is \$700.00. John W. Greenman in the SW $\frac{1}{4}$ of Sec. 8 has a house, fences and clearing to the value of \$500.00. John E. Greenman in the NW $\frac{1}{4}$ of Sec. 8 has a house and clearing to the value of \$300.00. B. J. Shinabarger has a house situated S.15*W., 6.85 chs. from the N $\frac{1}{4}$ Sec. cor. of Sec. 12. He has 3 or 4 acres cleared and partly under cultivation. The value of his improvements is about \$400.00. Nels Nelson has a house situated S.33 $\frac{1}{2}$ *E., 28.90 chs. from the N. $\frac{1}{4}$ Sec. cor. of Sec. 12. He has about 3 acres slashed. The value of his improvements is about \$150.00.
