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GENERAL DESCRIPTION

This township is covered with a valueable growth of timber, for milling purposes. The different qualities are Fir, Cedar, Hemlock, and Sugar Pine. The streams all have a Heavy fall and will furnish almost any amount of water power.

Plenty of good grazing land is found in the Northern and Western part of the Tp. Gold in small quantities has been found on some of the small streams. There are settlers located in secs. 11, 12, 14 and 22.
