General Description

The quality of land in this township is about the common average. The hilly part not covered with fir timber is well adapted to grazing, being open oak hills with good grass usually to their summits. The prairies in the vicinity of the small streams & creeks, are usually small but of an excellent quality. Timber for all practical purposes is abundant, such as fir, cedar, ash, maple, sugar pine & laurel. This township is usually well watered. Valuable salt springs have been discovered in secs. 22 & 23. Sandstone is the prevailing rock in this Township, granite, hornblende and quartz are occasionally found.
