General Description

The portion of this township included in this survey

is mountainous land, and the drainage is to the West.

The soil, is a fine, dark-brown, dry loam; one to three

feet deep, and on a gravelly and clay sub-soil.

The timber is fir, principally, with scattering growths

of cedar and hemlock, laurel and chinquapin. The under-

growth is very dense, with very little grass.

The township is watered by numerous creeks, spring-branches

and small springs

Mrs. J. Cockelreas is the only settler in this portion

of the township. The improvements consist of a frame

house, barn and sheds, with a garden, small orchards and

meadow, all within a clearing of about 10 acres.

The trails are good, and a wagon road extends up to the

homestead.
