GENERAL DESCRIPTION.

This Township is composed of high, rolling hills, generally timbered with open Oak timber, with Fir, Maple, Laurel, etc. on ravine and North slopes of hills and valleys, part of which is prairie and part Oak openings. It is watered by the South Fork of the Umpqua running around and through it. It is generally a very rapid stream with a very rough rocky bottom, making but few fords passable for roads. The banks are generally low on one side, gravelly and sandy and higher on the other, but considerable of the country on both sides of it in most places is subject to overflow from high water. Soil in the valleys is generally good, 2nd rate, sometimes 1st and 3rd rate. On hills, 2nd and 3rd rate.
