

Subdivisions of T. 27 S., R. 7 W.

CHAINS

The foregoing fractional Township contains the summit of the ridge of the Coast Range Mountains. I think the range will average in height at least one thousand feet from the foot of the mountain. There are benches on the East slope of the mountain, where settlers may, and have taken up land and made homes. There are a few rich spots of land on these benches only; the balance is much of it rough, broken and third rate land. Water is excellent from springs and streams and quite abundant.

Timber, for all practical purposes on the East slope of the mountain is abundant and very good. It is also quite as good or better on the West slope, but too difficult of transportation to settlement to make it pay at present.

From the established Standard SE. cor. of Sec. 36, Tp. 27 S., R. 8 W. with the foregoing named assistants, I run North on a trial line to retrace the East Bdy. of Sec. 36.

- 7.38 Dry gulch, course East 60 ft. above cor.
- 11.75 Branch, 2 lks. wide, flows SE.
- 40.00  $\frac{1}{4}$  Sec. cor. between Secs. 31 and 36, 4 lks. West. Still ascend.
- 60.00 Enter Fir timber at spur of mountain on left, 250 ft. above branch; descend
- 62.23 Branch, 2 lks. wide, course East 50 ft. below spur; ascend.
- 80.13 Intersect at a point 16 lks. East from where I establish the cor. of Secs. 25, 30, 31 and 36, 200 ft. above
