Subdivisions, T. 29 S., R. 8 W.

CHAINS

Set an iron post, 3 ft. long, 1 in. diam., 28 ins. in the ground, for $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor., with brass cap marked

$$\frac{1}{4} \frac{S12}{S13}$$

1924

from which (the original bearing trees)

A white oak, 40 ins. diam., bears N.30*E., 103 lks. dist., (not N.32*E.), blazes plain, marks grown over.

A white oak, 16 ins. diam., bears S.64*E., 86 lks. dist., blazes plain, marks grown over, not opened.

New bearing trees:

A white oak, 10 ins. diam., bears N.11 $\frac{1}{2}$ *E., 52 lks. dist., marked $\frac{1}{4}$ S 12 B T.

A white oak, 14 ins. diam., bears S.83*E., 37 lks. dist., marked $\frac{1}{4}$ S 13 B T.

Thence from the $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor..

S.89*37'E., bet. secs. 12 and 13.

Descend SE. slope, m 148 ft.

- 0.50 Leave opening; enter heavy timber, bears NW. and SE.
 4.40 Old road, bears NE. and SW.
 7.30 Draw, course, SE.
 11.35 Draw, course SE.; thence nearly level land.
 12.85 Old road, bears N. and S.; ascend steep W. slope, 660 ft.
 39.54 Intersect the cor. of secs. 12 and 13, on the E. bdy. of the Tp., heretofore described.

Land, mountainous.

Soil, rocky clay loam, 3rd rate.

Timber, fir, oak, laurel, chinquapin, and cedar.

Undergrowth, hazel, fir, laurel, and chinquapin.

From the cor. of secs. 1 and 12, on the E. bdy. of the Tp.

N.89*13'W., bet. secs. 1 and 12.

Over rolling land, through heavy timber and dense undergrowth.
