portion is heavily timbered and nearly the whole area is covered with dense undergrowth. The tract is very difficult to survey.

The tract is well watered by springs and small streams.

No mineral deposits of value seem to have been found in this tract.

Dumore Bar Creek, the tributaries of which penetrate the north and northeast portions of this tract, has produced gold in quantities to justify placer operations.

Isidore Rondeau, in sec. 33, has a good house, barn and other buildings, some 40 acres under fence with about 10 acres under cultivation, several head of horses and a small herd of cattle. A. L. Herman, in sec. 32, has a cabin and clearing of three or four acres. J. Hutchison, in sec. 31, has a cabin and barn and five or six acres under cultivation. Ward, in sec. 31, has four or five acres under fence, the greater part in cultivation; a cabin and barn. Graham, in sec. 28, has a cabin and about 10 acres under fence. Sam Straight, in secs. 21 and 28, has a cabin and five or six acres under fence, partly in cultivation. Geo. Rondeau has a cabin and a considerable area of cleared land on the Herseshee Barn in sec. 29. The following named persons have cabins and small clearings and enclosures: Karl Johnson and Howard Rice in sec. 31; Paul Geary in sec. 33; T. Padden in sec. 29; T. E. Cunningham in sec. 29; Wm. Lorenz in sec. 19.
