

Subdivisional Lines of T. 29 S., R. 1 W.,

CHAINS	
27.00	Top of spur, 300 ft. above branch, bears E. Descend.
32.75	Branch, 1 lk. wide, course E.
37.60	Branch, 2 lks. wide, 250 ft. below top of spur., course SE. Ascend.
40.00	My line falls 48 lks. W. of the $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor. which is a stone, 4x4x3 ins. above ground, firmly set, marked and witnessed as described by the Surveyor General. The line bears, N.0*39'W. Thence from the $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor. N.0*2'W., retracing the line bet. secs. 15 and 16.
42.50	Top of spur, 200 ft. above branch, bears SE. Descend.
49.10	Branch, 2 lks. wide, course E.
52.00	Enter an old burn, bears NW. and SE.
57.00	Re-enter heavy timber, bears NW. and SE.
69.50	Top of rock bluff, 50 ft. high, bears NW. and SE.
80.04	My line falls 48 lks. W. of the cor. of secs. 9, 10, 15 and 16, heretofore described. The line bears N.0*39'E. line The four miles of/retraced by me is a straight line, well marked and measured, with corner monuments permanently set. The bearing is N.0*39'E.

GENERAL DESCRIPTION.

This T. is rough, broken and mountainous except sections 25, 26, 35 and 36, which are rolling and level.

The T. is well watered by the N. Fork of the S. Umpqua River and small streams tributary thereto.

The T. is covered with a heavy growth of fir, and pine timber some of which is of an exceptional good quality.

The soil is a clay loam and stony, ranging from 2nd to 4th. rate.
