CHAINS

A white fir 8 ins diam bears N 70\*E 29 lks. dist marked T 29 S R 1 W S 7 B T.

GENERAL DESCRIPTION

This line, for the greater part of its distance, runs nearly parallel with the long ridge which forms the divide between Deadman Creek and the North Fork of the South Umpqua River, along the west slope to Deadman Creek. This slope is sparsely timbered, and is covered for the most of its extent with dense undergrowth.

The adjoining range of sections in T. 29 S., R. 2 W., contains some land suitable for agricultural purposes, principally in secs. 24 and 25.
