Soil, clay and stony, 3rd and 4th rate.

Timber, fir, hemlock.

GENERAL DESCRIPTION

This line extends across rough, broken country for the greater portion of its length, the exceptions being portions of the north boundary of secs. 2, 3, and 4. The township lying north of this line contains considerable land suitable for agriculture of the same general character as that appropriated by the settlers in T.30 S., R.2 W.

From the cor of secs. 25, 30, 31 and 36, North retracing E Bdy. of sec. 25; at 39.76 chs. fall 38 lks. W. of the $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor., and at 79.89 chs. fall 48 lks. W. of the cor. of secs. 19, 24, 25 and 30.
