CHAINS

General Description

The general character of the land in this township is mountainous, the drainage being principally to the south. The soil is a thin dark dry loam, loose and gravelly, on a rocky clay subsoil.

The township is covered with an all-age stand of heavy timber, consisting of fir, pine, cedar, hemlock, laurel and chinquapin.

The land is mostly non mineral in character. Some placer work has been done on Texas Gulch and Coffee Creek and Mr. Webb has a cinnabar prospect in Sec. 34 that he is working at the present time.

Water is abundant.

Ben Williams and John Rondeau are the only settlers in the township. Mr. Williams on H.E.S. No. 141 has about 20 acres under cultivation and J. Rondeau on H.E.S. No. 140 has about 8 acres under cultivation.

No roads cross through the township, but trails are numerous and good. The U.S. Forest Service has a telephone line from Tiller to Peel along the main U.S. Forest Service trail.
