

Exteriors of T. 29 S., R. 4 W.

CHAINS

Soil, gravelly, 3rd rate.
 Timber, Fir, Pine, Laurel, Oak.
 Undergrowth, mostly young Firs, Laurels and Oaks, Hazel.
 May 1st.

SUBDIVISIONS of T. 29 S., R. 4 W.,
 As surveyed by W. F. Briggs, Deputy Surveyor,
 Under Special Instruction, dated Jan. 18, 1899.

Survey commenced April 13, 1899.

I commence at the $\frac{1}{4}$ corner on line between Secs. 8 and 17, T. 29 S., R. 4 W. Willamette Meridian, Oregon., by setting Fir post, 3 inches sq., 3 ft. long, 24 ins. in the ground, scribed $\frac{1}{4}$ S 8 on N. face, and S17 on S. face, from which the original bearing trees were standing and in good state of preservation, to wit:

An Oak, 12 ins. diam., bears S.30*W., 23 lks.

which I remarked $\frac{1}{4}$ S 17 BT.

A Fir, 18 ins. diam., bears N.20*W., 36 lks.

which I remarked $\frac{1}{4}$ S 8 BT.

Var. 18*45'E.

Thence

East, on Random line between Secs. 8 and 17 to an intersection of the cor. to Secs. 8, 9, 16 and 17.

31.25 Intersect Blazed line 5.24 chs. N.7*7'E., of established cor. of Secs. 8, 9, 16 and 17. Witness trees all standing.

Set new post as per witness trees called for: Secs. 9 and 16, T. 29 S., R. 4 W., to wit:

A Laurel, 4 ins. diam., bears N.15*E., 92 lks.

A Laurel, 12 ins. diam., bears S.85*E., 25 lks.

I destroyed all marks appertaining to Secs. 8 and 17.
