

Subdivisions of T. 29 S., R. 7 W.

CHAINS

Timber, Fir, Pine, Cedar, Madrone and Oak.

Undergrowth, Chinquapin and Manzanita.

July 1, 1910.

July 2, 1910: At 8h 4 m a.m., l.m.t., I set off 43\*1' North on the latitude arc, 23\*5' North on the declination arc, and determine a meridian with the solar at the corner of secs. 25, 26, 35 and 36 .

Thence I run

W. on a sectional correction line between secs. 26 and 35.

Ascend E. slope, over mountainous land, through heavy timber and scattering undergrowth, exceptionally difficult to survey.

1.50 Top of spur, extending N.30\*E., 30 ft. above sec. corner  
Thence descend, W. slope.

19.67 Rice Creek, 2 lks. wide, course N.70\*E., 100 ft. below top of spur, ascend.

40.00 Set a conglomerate stone, 15 x 12 x 6 ins., 10 ins. in the ground, for  $\frac{1}{4}$  sec. corner, marked  $\frac{1}{4}$  on N. face, from which,

A Fir, 24 ins. diam., bears N.75\*E., 6 lks.

Marked  $\frac{1}{4}$  S 26 B T.

A Fir, 24 ins. diam., bears S.13\*W., 81 lks.

Marked  $\frac{1}{4}$  S 35 B T.

From this corner Ada Thorpe's house bears N.32\*E., 1.00 chain distant.

45.28 A trail, bears N. and S.

54.25 Top of divide between Rice and Olalla Creeks, bears S.20\* E. and N.20\*W., 650 ft. above Rice Creek. Descend. 150 ft. to

80.00 Intersect N. and S. line, 2.30 chs. South of the corner
